



TOURS

TROW AND HOLDEN

Makers of fine stoneworking tools for more than 100 years. 9:00 AM—Thursday and Friday.

45 South Main Street, in Barre, Vermont. Take a guided tour through the T&H factory and watch tools being made.

ROCK OF AGES QUARRY TOUR

9:00 AM—Wednesday Thursday and Friday

Meet at the visitor center to watch video of the quarry process. Guided tour will begin at 9:30 which includes views of the 600 foot deep quarry site and the 160,000 square-foot factory where stone cutting and carving can be observed from an observation deck. Price (paid to quarry): \$6.50.

HOPE CEMETERY in BARRE is well worth a visit for an (unguided) tour (as is Green Mount Cemetery in Montpelier).

HIKING/BIKING

MEALS:

Wednesday through Friday, LUNCH will be provided. Participants will make their own breakfast and dinner arrangements

On Saturday night there will be a COMMUNAL DINNER at the VGM and those who wish to participate will be asked to make a donation when they register,

LODGING:

Be warned, lodging in Barre is little steep and it fills up fast because the fall 'leafpeeping' season is near. It may be necessary to stay outside Barre. Symposium Participants are encouraged to make reservations early on—NOW is not too soon to do that!

CAMPING:

There are private and state park camping sites in the area. An excellent private campground is located just outside Barre: *https://millstonehill.com/types/campsite/*

Also the VGM is allowing a limited number of tents to be placed without charge on land adjacent to the Museum. Portapotties will be available. For those without tents we found a place in Massachusetts that sells inexpensive one or two person tents with free delivery to Barre!

WORKSHOPS: The only workshops scheduled are two stone letter-carving workshops in slate and granite led by Karin Sprague and Rob Gil at the VGM on Monday and Tuesday, September 23-24.

PRESENTATIONS:

There will be a few 'Long-Form' presentations by notable speakers.

BUT THE PRINCIPAL PRESENTERS WILL BE YOU,

THE SYMPOSIUM PARTICIPANTS

The emphasis will be on a series of Short-Form/Show-and-Tell Presentations by Symposium Participants.

These will be in the *Pecha Kucha* style, wherein presenters show 20 or less images of STONE WORK and STONE ART—that you've done or that you photographed on your travels. Each image will be shown for 20 seconds as you comment on the material. There will be a very brief Q & A period.

This is an opportunity to show—and to see—examples of each other's work. Each Symposium participant is invited is invited to show, and comment upon, many as 20 images, or as few as 6.

Portions of the programs of previous Symposiums have included such presentations, the ones in 2018 in Ventura California were especially interesting and well organized. BUT, in Santa Fe in 2022 time was lost because many people showed up at the last minute with their photos on flash-drives or phones, and the schedule was improvised and disordered. **Therefore...**



JARED FLYNN, Certified Master Level Member of the Dry Stone Walling Association of Great Britain, Founding Member of The Stone Trust and its president from 2010-2014. Jared is known for his remarkable creative dry stone installations.



The statue pictured above, *The Sculptor*, honors the immigrant Italian artisans who came to Barre in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The monument, designed by Elmo Peduzzi was carved from a 30 ton block of Barre granite by Philip Paini from a model crafted by sculptor Giuliano Cecchinelli.

It is dedicated to one carver in particular, Milanese sculptor Carlo Abate, who came from Italy to Barre in 1896 and established the first art school in which students could learn drawing, design and other skills associated with the granite industry.

He also established a legacy, personified by the skilled artisans who emerged from the school that made Barre a well respected center of monumental carving in the USA. One imagines that Abate would approve of this artfully carved iconic figure that personifies the dignity of the artisan.




