

THE PERIODICAL GATHERING OF THE STONE 'TRIBE'

STONEWORK SYMPOSIUM 2024

AT THE VERMONT GRANITE MUSEUM BARRE, VERMONT SEPTEMBER 24-28



There will be an emphasis on Dry Stone Walling during STONEWORK SYMPOSIUM 2024—not only in the presentation program but in the inclusion of a collaborative dry stone walling project.

STONEWORK SYMPOSIUM 2008, took place in Barre and featured a Dry Stone Walling Workshop and a Dry Stone Walling competition.

In the course of the competition a stone Fire Circle was built. The workmanship, however, was of variable quality and there is now a consensus that it should be rebuilt. The return of STONEWORK SYMPOSIUM 2024 to Barre is an opportunity to do just that.

The competitors in 2008 were members of the Stone Foundation and what was then known as the Dry Stone Walling Association of Canada, which is now Dry stone Canada.

The Stone Trust did not exist at that time but it does now. Established in 2010, it is centered in Vermont, is closely associated with the Granite Museum and will be involved in the project of rebuilding the Fire Circle.



So, during the morning demonstration periods on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, September 25th, 26th and 27th, dry stone wallers from the Stone Foundation,The Stone Trust and Dry Stone Canada will work together to build 10 sections of wall between regularly spaced granite blocks—a new, improved dry stone Fire Circle.

Several wallers from each of the three organization have already indicated their interest and intention to be involved in this project and hopefully more will choose to come to Barre and participate with them in it. Members of The Stone Trust and Dry Stone Canada are entitled to the same discounted registration fee as members of the Stone Foundation receive.

Because Teruki Kamiya, founder of the Dry Stone Walling Association of Japan will be present, a fourth organization will be represented in the rebuild.

By the way, that dry stone arch was built (in a single day) during a Stone Foundation regional weekend gathering in Barre in 2011. It was dedicated to the victims of the twin towers tragedy on 9/11. It will remain in place.

LODGING:

Be warned, lodging in Barre is pricey and it not abundent because the fall 'leafpeeping' season is near. It may be necessary to stay outside Barre—SEE NOTICE ON NEXT PAGE about this.

CAMPING:

There are private and state park camping sites in the area. An excellent private campground is located just outside Barre: *https://millstonehill.com/types/campsite/*

The VGM is has space on its grounds where tents can be placed. Portapotties will be available there and campers will be able to shower at a facility not too far away.

For those without tents we found a place in Massachusetts https://www.hiltonstentcity.com/collections/tent—that sells inexpensive tents—less than the cost of a hotel or motel for 5 days—with free delivery to Barre! WORKSHOPS: There will be stone letter-carving workshops in slate and granite led by Karin Sprague and Rob Gil at the VGM on Monday and Tuesday, September 23-24.

PRESENTATIONS:

There will be a few 'Long-Form' presentations by notable speakers. BUT THE PRINCIPAL PRESENTERS WILL BE YOU, THE SYMPOSIUM PARTICIPANTS

The emphasis will be on a series of Short-Form Presentations

These will be in the *Pecha Kucha* style, wherein presenters show 20 or less images of STONE WORK and STONE ART—that you've done or that you photographed on your travels.

Each image will be shown for 20 seconds as you comment on the material. There will be a very brief Q & A period.

This is an opportunity to show—and to see—examples of each other's work. Each Symposium participant is invited is invited to show, and comment upon, many as 20 images, or as few as 6.

Portions of the programs of previous Symposiums have included such presentations, the ones in 2018 in Ventura California were especially interesting and well organized. BUT, in Santa Fe in 2022 time was lost because many people showed up at the last minute with their photos on flash-drives or phones, and the schedule was improvised and disordered. **Therefore...**

3) Take care in preparing your comments on the individual images you will show and practice your presentation, rehearsing your comments so each can be expressed within the 20 second time frame.



The statue pictured above, *The Sculptor*, honors the immigrant Italian artisans who came to Barre in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The monument, designed by Elmo Peduzzi was carved from a 30 ton block of Barre granite by Philip Paini from a model crafted by sculptor Giuliano Cecchinelli.

It is dedicated to one carver in particular, Milanese sculptor Carlo Abate, who came from Italy to Barre in 1896 and established the first art school in which students could learn drawing, design and other skills associated with the granite industry.

He also established a legacy, personified by the skilled artisans who emerged from the school that made Barre a well respected center of monumental carving in the USA. One imagines that Abate would approve of this artfully carved iconic figure that personifies the dignity of the artisan.
